

Guided Listening

Chasing Shadows

Accessing this piece in SMartmusic. will allow you to see your individual part. It is really interesting to explore the parts of the other instruments in the band or orchestra as well! Follow this link to see the score as you listen, which is what the director sees when conducting your ensemble.



Before you listen:

Take a look at the score and your individual part and go on a scavenger hunt. Think about the following questions as you explore the music. If your teacher asks you to, write your answers on a separate piece of paper!

- What words can you find throughout the music? How do those words help you understand how the music should be performed? (For example, the title, the tempo and/or style marking, etc.)
- What markings can you find throughout the music (trills, dynamics, articulations, etc.)? How do those markings help you understand how the music should be performed?
- Can you tell what key this piece is in?
- Are the melodies sustained or rhythmic? Are the accompaniment parts sustained or rhythmic?

While you listen:

Using your imagination, think about some of the following:

- Is this piece in a major key? Minor key? Can you tell by listening?
- The main theme occurs at measure 13. How many measures are there in each phrase?
- How does the accompaniment differ when the main theme is restated at measures 21, 49, 57, 75 and 83?
- Do these changes in accompaniment from passage to passage build momentum?
- At measure 13, what do you notice about the dynamics? Why is Violin I marked mezzo forte and all other instruments marked mezzo piano?
- Does this difference in dynamics happen anywhere else in the piece?
- The secondary theme occurs at measure 29. When this idea is restated at measure 37, how is the accompaniment different?
- At measure 57, what section plays the countermelody to the main theme? How many measures are in a phrase for the countermelody?
- Does this countermelody return at any point?
- Does the optional percussion part add to the overall mood of the piece?
- Use your imagination and try to picture a movie scene with this music. Can you describe the scene you imagine?
- Do you think the music reflects the title? Be creative and make up your own title! What does the music make you think of?
- Take special note of the phrasing in this piece and how this can impact the overall sound. How do you think phrasing could influence your own writing of a piece of music?
